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Chair’s Report

Welcome to this year’s Annual Report and yet another staggering year of blatantly discriminatory educational policy and practices, during which ALLFIE have nevertheless continued to seek opportunities to influence, build and persuade. When I reported to you in our previous Annual Report that we were looking ahead to continued uncertainties, little did we realise the breadth of those uncertainties. We have witnessed significant and disproportionate cuts in funding across the whole spectrum of welfare and public services to which Disabled people are entitled.

These concerns were further highlighted by the UN scrutiny of the UK’s obligations under the CRPD which, without much surprise to individuals and DPOs, concluded that the government was guilty of “grave and systematic violations”. ALLFIE, through ROFA (Reclaiming Our Futures Alliance), have been instrumental in ensuring the fundamental right to inclusive education.

A personal highlight has been our involvement through ROFA with the UN Geneva committee, the scrutiny of the UK government and specifically its lack of implementation of Article 24.

Equally important has been securing funding for ALLFIE’s Director to explore inclusive education in Finland and New Brunswick, Canada through the Winston Churchill Fellowship. This has

resulted in ALLFIE exploring and identifying an Interim Director. We have also been successful in a DRILL (Disability Research on Independent Living and Learning) project to explore schools’ responsibility to produce accessibility plans. Alongside these personal highlights we have continued to strengthen our alliances, contributed to debate, increased our media presence, and continued to develop our website presence and resources.

All of this work is made possible because of the commitment of ALLFIE staff, volunteers and its Director. I would like to take this opportunity to thank ALLFIE’s Director, Tara Flood, for her continued determination and clarity of thought. ALLFIE wishes her all the very best on her time away. I also would like to thank our members who have been with us over the years, campaigning and lobbying for transformative inclusive educational change. Thank you to the trustees for their continued support and contribution. I would also like to thank our funders who have been a source of support, not only financially, but who have shared our core values around the struggle and realisation of inclusive education.

Looking ahead we are mindful of new opportunities and continued uncertainties. As ever we will remain vigilant in seeking new funding streams, continue to strengthen our alliances and explore shared project opportunities. After over 25 years of ALLFIE and its involvement in the struggle for inclusive education, it is with regret that we are witnessing an increase in the number of families and individuals who have contacted us sharing their concern about being denied opportunities to attend their local mainstream school.

Whilst government rhetoric, ignorance and prejudice hold sway, ALLFIE will continue to highlight such discriminatory practices and policy and legislative inconsistencies. We have been consistently committed to our human right to inclusive education and to end segregated education. Sadly, much larger disability charities will not and remain silent on discriminatory educational practices. It is our self-determination, commitment to ideals of social justice and celebration of our differences that keep us grounded and committed.

Director's Report

As the Interim Director in the months of May 2018 – September 2018, it gives me great pleasure to write the Director's Report.

Since starting in my role it has become increasingly clear to me that ALLFIE is working in a very difficult climate with significant challenges. We continue to be affected by austerity, government educational ideology and opponents of inclusive education, and attracting funders interested in funding our work also continues to be a challenge, but as a recently appointed interim director it keeps me busy!

2017 was one of the greatest moments in our history: as one of the key partners of ROFA (Reclaiming Our Futures Alliance) we helped to successfully present key evidence to the UNCRPD (UN Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities) Committee for the scrutiny of the UK Government. The outcome reported that the UK government was causing a "human catastrophe" for Disabled people. They also stated that under Article 24 (Education) inclusive education is a right and not a "choice".

We have been successful in securing further funding to continue the Inclusion Champions Network which has been effective in building links with schools, parents, young people and Disabled people's organisations. Our campaign work is increasingly effective at gathering cases which we can draw on when responding to consultations as evidence to support our argument that inclusive education must be a right and not a choice. We have redeveloped our website, making it much more impactful, credible and accessible to a variety of visitors and raising our profile as an organisation.

Given the response from the UNCRPD Committee our focus for 2018 is on putting our financial situation onto a stronger footing to help continue our vital work campaigning for inclusive education.

I would like to thank all of the ALLFIE employees, volunteers, partners, allies, members, funders and donors for their support and hard work throughout 2017 and especially for their support in my interim role. I wish ALLFIE a successful 2018 in driving ALLFIE's vision to 'educate, not segregate'.

Report and Financial Statements for the year ended 31 March 2018

Report of the Council

Alliance for Inclusive Education Council members (who are trustees for the purposes of charity law) present their report along with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2018. This report also constitutes a directors' report as required by the Companies Act 2006 and has been prepared taking advantage of the exemptions conferred by Part 15 of this Act.

The financial statements comply with the Charities Act 2011, the Companies Act 2006, the Memorandum & Articles of Association, and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015). The company has taken advantage of the exemption to not have to prepare a strategic report in accordance with "The Companies Act 2006 (Strategic Report and Directors' Report) Regulations 2013".

OUR PURPOSES AND ACTIVITIES

The objectives of the charity are to advance for the public benefit, irrespective of (physical, sensory, intellectual or emotional) impairment, age, gender, race, belief/religion, sexuality, social status, transgender, and any other protected characteristic, the ending of segregation of Disabled learners categorised as having 'special educational needs' from the mainstream education system in the UK (and the right to the education and inclusion of all learners within fully resourced mainstream educational settings).

The main activity of the charity continues to be lobbying for changes to legislation, policy and practices that discriminate against Disabled learners, including those with SEN labels, and that prevent inclusion. This involves campaigning work, capacity building with individuals and groups to create change at a grassroots level, training and information sharing work, fundraising for the core budget and engaging in new projects.

Objectives for the years 2017 – 20

- To promote a wider understanding of the benefits of inclusive education for all;
- To lead the lobby for change in legislation and policy to ensure inclusive education as a right for all;
- To build the capacity of the inclusive education movement to become a more effective voice of influence; and
- To ensure maximum effectiveness of ALLFIE and its future sustainability.

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE 2017/18

Objective 1: To promote a wider understanding of the benefits of inclusive education for all

Our campaign work seriously paid off in 2017 for ALLFIE. We were successful in presenting evidence at the UNCRPD (UN Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities) Disability Committee demonstrating the failings of the UK government towards Disabled people. We have also contributed evidence to support families dealing with SEN cuts.

Other activities we have been involved in include:

- Attendance at the European Network on Independent Living conference and Freedom Drive held in Brussels. We presented on the importance of education to the independent living movement.
- Production of three issues of Inclusion Now magazine, which continues to be a key publication of the inclusive education movement and a partnership between ALLFIE, World of Inclusion and Inclusive Solutions. The magazine continues to receive a positive response.
- Submission to the GLA Investigation into SEND Provision in London. Disabled pupils in London are more likely than those from anywhere else in the UK to face barriers to mainstream, and to end up in segregated education.
- Producing a briefing on the General Election: we found a 10% decline of Disabled pupils with SEN attending mainstream schools - a shocking indictment of the government's lack of commitment to human rights.

- Producing a briefing on judgements in the European Court of Human Rights case of Enver Şahin v Turkey. The European Court of Human Rights said that Disabled students have a human right to mainstream education. Disabled students can expect that universities, colleges and schools will be accessible to wheelchair users.
- Redesigning and rewriting website content and structure for the new website to better present the argument for and background to inclusive education.

Objective 2: To lead the lobby for change in legislation and policy to ensure inclusive education as a right for all

Austerity has resulted in a hardening of the political climate toward inclusive education. It has demonstrated a greater need for ALLFIE to review our approach and strategy to our campaign work. We have greatly increased our effectiveness at collecting and recording evidence which has helped the way we persuade and campaign for inclusive education. There continues to be a need for greater lobbying and campaigning to force the UK government to recognise that our domestic legislation and policy are inconsistent with UNCRPD Article 24 (Education) and ensure that inclusive education becomes a right and not a choice. We have been successful in developing new contacts with key players in influential positions, maintaining contacts with the Department of Education and responding to consultations. We have:

- Completely redeveloped ALLFIE’s website, improving our public profile. This has led to an increase in members, more enquiries, longer website sessions, more pages visited and more return visitors. In the period 1st April 2017 – 31st March 2018 43,500 people visited our website. It has also led to a noticeable upswing in press interest as journalists seek our comment on national educational issues. ALLFIE has been featured in The

- Guardian, the Times Educational Supplement, Sec Ed magazine, You and Yours and Radio 5 Live news;
- Gathered evidence for the shadow report submitted to the UNCRPD Disability committee which scrutinised our government on the implementation of Article 24 (education);
- Become involved in the forthcoming National March Against SEN and EHC Failures – families are helping us build a strong evidence base for how our education system is failing to uphold Disabled pupils’ and students’ rights to inclusive education;
- Worked with local SEND cuts campaign groups – eg Hackney Special Education Crisis,
- Been approached by families wanting us to support legal action around SEND provision within mainstream schools;
- Undertaken London local elections work with Inclusion London;
- Produced briefings on various campaign issues affecting Disabled pupils’ and students’ rights to inclusive education;
- Reported on how the courts are using UNCRPD and ECHR to uphold Disabled pupils’ and students’ human rights to inclusive education when countries are violating these.

Objective 3: To build the capacity of the inclusive education movement to become a more effective voice of influence

We have been successful in securing funding to continue to focus on achieving our objective of building capacity and becoming more effective in promoting the interest of the inclusive education movement.

Thanks to City Bridge Trust we have been able to continue the work of the Inclusion Champions Network, which has been effective in building alliances and our capacity to strengthen and influence the voice of the inclusive education movement.

We delivered trainer training sessions to ten DPOs. We delivered two “Knowledge is Power” train a trainer sessions to five DPOs

and created a downloadable toolkit for website visitors. The “Knowledge is Power” programme has enabled DPOs to engage with young people in a fun, impactful way.

We were successful in our bid to Disability Research and Independent Living and Learning (DRILL) and have been awarded £39,990 as part of their National Lottery funded research programme into independent living for Disabled people. ALLFIE has appointed a researcher, Armineh Soorenian who took up her role in May 2018. The research project will look into school accessibility plans and their effectiveness in promoting inclusion.

Objective 4: To ensure maximum effectiveness of ALLFIE and its future sustainability

While the challenges ALLFIE faces are multi-faceted and intertwined, this year was a turning point with a slight improvement in our financial situation, thanks to a Trust for London grant which has enabled us to continue our work around capacity building and upskilling Disabled People’s Organisations to work with young Disabled people. It has also helped us to successfully engage and work in partnership with DPOs, build our networks and ensure maximisation of outcome.

The Disability Research and Independent Living and Learning (DRILL) grant will help us to improve our understanding of the effectiveness of School Accessibility Plans, contributing towards our future objectives. We have worked collaboratively with DPOs, stakeholders, allies and partners to deliver on ALLFIE’s objectives, focusing on future sustainability to ensure our continuing ability to promote the benefits of inclusive education as a human right.

Public benefit

The Charities Commission in its ‘Charities and Public Benefit’ Guidance requires that two key principles be met in order to show that an organisation’s aims are for the public benefit: first, there must be an identifiable benefit and second, the benefit must be to the public or a section of the public. The Trustees confirm that they have referred to the Charities Commission’s general guidance on public benefit when reviewing the Charity’s Aims and Objectives.

Financial Review

The financial statements show that the charity had net income for the year of £3,522 (2016/17 – £227). At 31 March 2018 the charity had total funds of £77,075, all of which were unrestricted funds. Unrestricted funds consist of £50,000 of designated funds and £27,075 of general unrestricted funds.

The trustees can confirm that the assets of the company are available and adequate to fulfill the obligations of the company.

Principal Funding Sources

Funding the core of ALLFIE’s work will continue to be a challenge in 2018/19.

We are incredibly grateful to our funders and supporters for this year, which include the Esmee Fairbairn Foundation, Comic Relief, Trust for London, National Children’s Bureau, City Bridge Trust, Awards for All and Inclusion London. Looking to the future we need to continue to find ways of using our current financial position and profile as a platform to secure additional core funding to support our work beyond the lifetime of current funding streams.

Finally, and equally importantly, we want to say a big thank you to ALLFIE’s membership who continue to be supportive of our work through donations and membership fees. We could not do what we do without you! The challenge of staying true to our Principles whilst working in an increasingly difficult political and funding climate is only possible because of the unifying strength we gain from knowing our members and supporters share our vision of an inclusive future for ALL.



Risk Management

The trustees have considered the possible major risks to the company and have established systems to mitigate these risks.

Reserves Policy

In light of ALLFIE's current financial situation, the trustees decided this year to adjust the Reserves Policy to hold unrestricted free reserves equivalent to three months' total expenditure to guard against unexpected events and loss of funding. This will allow the charity a period of time to respond and seek alternative funding and will help it to continue its activities and maintain its solvency during this period. Using total expenditure to calculate free reserves reflects that the charity's main activities are funded by restricted grants.

Based on 2018/19 expenditure gives a free reserves target of £47,500. At £27,075, the unrestricted free reserves are £20,425 below target.

Future Developments

We anticipate that in 2018/19, with the support of our new grants, our future looks more positive than the previous year. We will require an increase in collaborative working with our stakeholders, partners and allies in order to achieve our objectives.

ALLFIE will continue to be the lead voice in representing Disabled learners in policy matters, and in promoting and sharing information on the importance and benefits of inclusive education to Disabled learners in mainstream settings. To help achieve our future development objectives, ALLFIE will:

- Work to increase our membership and donations;
- Look for opportunities to build our networks, secure funding, and continue to influence change;
- Seek funders to continue our collaborative work with DPOs;
- Put pressure on government to address recommendations from the UN Disability Committee on Article 24 (Education);
- Continue the Inclusion Champions Project as Stage 2 gets underway (funded by City Bridge Trust);
- Roll out the Disability Research and Independent Living and Learning (DRILL) research project exploring the effectiveness of school accessibility plans;
- Develop and upskill ALLFIE's board, promoting strong governance and sustainability;
- Develop new ways to engage with young Disabled people through social media;
- Seek to ensure that principles of inclusion are central to policy and decision making discussions;
- Continue to identify policy gaps and inconsistencies that segregate Disabled pupils and students;

ALLFIE is calling on all our stakeholders, allies, partners, donors and funders to promote our work about the growing inequality in education for Disabled people. ALLFIE will continue to campaign for 'a world where Inclusive Education is a right not a struggle'.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT**Governing document**

The Alliance for Inclusive Education is incorporated as a company limited by guarantee. The governing document is the Memorandum and Articles of Association. The Alliance for Inclusive Education is also a registered charity.

Recruitment and Appointment of Trustees

We are delighted that Disabled people remain a majority within the membership of the Council and as part of our recruitment policy we continue to seek new members who reflect a diverse community.

The commitment to Disabled people remaining in the leadership of ALLFIE is reflected in the company's governing document which states that the membership of the Council is required to maintain the ratio of Disabled to non-disabled directors at 60:40.

Under the requirements of the Memorandum and Articles of Association, Council members are elected for a period of three years after which they must be re-elected at the next AGM. The Council can elect to co-opt new members who will then be elected to full Council membership at the following AGM.

Trustee Induction and Training

As part of induction procedures ALLFIE invites proposed trustees to trustee board meetings, and to informal discussions about their interest and possible contribution. Once formally elected the new trustee is provided with an 'induction pack' which includes an audit skills check that documents the skills and experiences they bring to the charity. The pack also includes a form for information about any access requirements.

Organisational structure

The charity is under the overall control and direction of the trustee board who meet approximately every six weeks. Trustees delegate the day-to-day running of the company to the Chief Executive Officer, Tara Flood.

Our seven principles

- Diversity enriches and strengthens all communities
- All learners' different learning styles and achievements are equally valued, respected and celebrated by society
- All learners are enabled to fulfil their potential by taking into account individual requirements and needs
- Support is guaranteed and fully resourced across the whole learning experience
- All learners need friendship and support from people their own age
- All children and young people are educated together as equals in their local communities
- Inclusive education is incompatible with segregated provision both within and outside mainstream education

They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.




Income and Expenditure 2017/18
